

IDEAL Small Grants Program

Objective: Offer Implementers access to resources to support design, testing and sharing of food security and nutrition promising practices, resources and systems

Focus: Address knowledge and capacity gaps surrounding IDEAL's Content Focus Areas and BHA Policy & Guidance for USAID Title II Implementers beyond any single activity or organization

Dissemination and Utilization: Implement grant-funded dissemination plan during award and support IDEAL-led dissemination after the award

Why Qual M&E? Why Now?

- IDEAL focus on qualitative M&E: A call from FSN Network and partners
 - Example: <u>FAQ on Qualitative M&E</u> <u>during COVID-19</u>
- Release of USAID BHA qualitative M&E guidance

RFA Purpose

To "strengthen the design, implementation, and utilization of qualitative data used in program monitoring and discrete studies."

Qualitative methods included in data collection methods

Integration of qualitative methods throughout document

- Throughout, applied to different components of M&E system
- Monitoring, PDM, Baseline/Endline Study, Evaluation

RFA Focus Areas

Applications must address knowledge and capacity gaps to fully operationalizing qualitative analysis in line with the BHA P&G for Monitoring, Evaluation and Reporting

8 Priority Areas (see p. 4-5 of RFA, also noted in P&G)		

Process monitoring	Unexpected and unexplained achievements
Outcome monitoring	Post-distribution monitoring
Unintended affects	Sequencing, layering, integration
Monitoring sustainability	Secondary adoption

Scoring Criteria

Criteria	Points
Activity Objectives and Review of Secondary Literature	20 Points
Design, Implementation Plan, and Implementation Timeline*	20 Points
Deliverables and Plan for Utilization and Socialization	25 Points
Contributions to RFA and BHA Objectives	15 Points
Applicant Role and Background	10 Points
Budget and Budget Narrative	5 Points
Developing Country Preference	5 Points

*Demonstrates adaptation for COVID-19 recommendations and regulations

Key Details & Unique Aspects

- Up to 5 awards of <\$100,000 will be granted
- Fixed Amount Subawards will be utilized, so payment is based on achievement of milestones and not costs-incurred
- Food security and nutrition implementing organizations can only <u>lead</u> one application
- Preference for lead or collaborating organizations headquartered in developing countries as defined by USAID
- Award for stand alone activity or incorporated with another activity

Eligibility

Lead Applicant Must Have:

- USAID funding in past three years as prime or sub
- Capacity to manage comparable awards
- Relevant past performance
- DUNS/SAM registration
- Activity implemented in countries where BHA funded Title II activities in FY 2019, 2020 or 2021
- Lead or collaborating applicant must be legally recognized in country(ies) of implementation
- Activity approach must be feasible during COVID-19 pandemic and follow USAID and country guidance

The following are <u>not</u> eligible to apply for grants under this RFA:

- Members of the IDEAL consortium: Save the Children, The Kaizen Company, Mercy Corps, and TANGO International
- Individuals and/or sole proprietorships
- Government entities, including ministries
- Multilateral organizations
- Firms operating as commercial companies or other organizations (including non-profit and nongovernmental organizations) that are wholly or partially owned by foreign governments or agencies

Important Dates to Consider

Question Period Ends: February 5, 2021

Application Package Due: March 5, 2021

Target Award Date: July 2021



Maximum Award Period: 12 months
