Our Approach: iDARE

• **Identify** gender and social inclusion gaps and barriers through a desk review, analysis, key informant interviews (KIIs) and focus group discussions (FGDs).

• **Design** locally contextualized programmatic interventions and activities to effectively address identified gaps and barriers.

• **Apply/Assess** knowledge gained, lessons learned, and changes identified overtime through monitoring and evaluation, the collection and assessment of sex-disaggregated data, and periodic assessments.

Record knowledge, qualitative and quantitative data, best practices, lessons learned in line
with effective and transparent knowledge management and monitoring and evaluation
methodologies

• **Expand** and scale-up project initiatives, if proven successful; if proven ineffective, identify and design other changes to reach project objectives and goals.

Capacity building with adolescent girls and young women in Uganda to reduce risk behaviors and HIV infection under the DREAMS partnership.






Capacity building with health providers in more than 30 countries globally now focusing on LAC in Zika prevention and care under USAID's ASSIST Project.

% of AGYW Engaging in High Risk Sexual Activities




Women Influencing Health, Education, and Rule of Law

Gender and WASH

Access to safe water and adoption of safe sanitation and hygiene practices are critical to several gender-specific issues, including:



Maternal and newborn health

- WASH-related illnesses during pregnancy are linked to low birth weight.
- Undernutrition in newborns.

Education for adolescent girls and young women

- Lost opportunities for learning.
- Burden of menstrual hygiene management (MHM) for girls.

Preventing gender-based violence

 Women vulnerable to harassment or violence when fetching water, using shared toilets, or practicing open defecation.

Empowering women economically

 Women and girls perform most of the unpaid labor associated with WASH in households and communities.



Opportunities to Address Gender in WASH, Engage Women + Achieve a "Better Balance"

- Gender Analysis- very important
- Gender Sensitization
- Capacity building in gender integration
- Data driven solutions
- Context is critical
- Men not only supporters but also clients





Opportunities Continued

- Leadership is not only having equal number of men and women on committees
 - Personal Expectations and confidence
 - Cultures
 - Work-life balance
 - "Do no harm"
- Involving women and men at all stages of planning, implementing and monitoring programs.
- Empowering women should start early: girls to take leadership roles at schools
- Identify champions for change
