



Conflict & Security: Living Peace

- More peaceful relationships
- Reduced alcohol abuse
- Improved control of men's frustration and aggression
- Greater income-sharing with wives
- Happier children
- Improved health outcomes



"I asked for forgiveness from them [my children] and now we spend much time together, we are now good friends and very united."

Economic Justice: Journeys of Transformation

- Increased income
 (particularly for poorest
 couples)
- Increases in men's unpaid care work
- Reduced couple conflict



"I thought that 'being a man' means that I have to do nothing in the house, but now I learned how I can do things together (with my wife)." - Participant, Rwanda



Youth & Equality: Program H

- More gender-equitable attitudes and behaviors generally
- Improved couple communication
- Reduced gender-based violence
- Increased condom use
- Improved attitudes around caregiving



"... I learned to talk more with my girlfriend [...] it's important to know what the other person wants, listen to them. Before [the workshops], I just worried about myself."

The Data: What do we know?

We've carried out the most comprehensive survey on men and gender equality.

- Younger men, with more education are more likely to be pro-gender equality
- Violence creates violence, and the most traumatic form is witnessing violence against mothers
- Caregiving creates caregiving, men who see their fathers in caring relationships more likely to do same.
- Gender attitudes matter, they predict use of violence, participation in household, caregiving, and satisfaction
- Men who buy into gender equality (and their partners) are happier and healthier



The Data: How do we use it?

International Men and Gender Equality Survey (IMAGES) uses:

- Develop a global and national database and assessment of men's behaviors and attitudes with a standardized instrument
- Provide a baseline or benchmark for monitoring changes in men's behaviors and attitudes
- Awareness-raising activities and advocacy nationally and internationally
- Program development and planning

Another example: GEM Scale

The Gender Equitable Men Scale is:

- 24 Item psycho-metrically valid scale
- Designed specifically for program evaluation
- Measures multiple domains within the construct of gender norms
- Addresses program goals related to sexual and intimate relationships and sexual and reproductive health and disease prevention
- Broadly applicable yet culturally sensitive
- Easily administered



GEM Scale Items

- Gender: Changing diapers, giving kids a bath & feeding kids are mother's responsibility.
- Violence: A woman should tolerate violence in order to keep her family together.
- Sexuality: Men need sex more than women do.
- Masculinities: If someone insults me, I will defend my reputation, with force if I have to.
- Reproductive Health: It is a woman's responsibility to avoid getting pregnant



What can the GEM Scale tell you?

More support for equitable norms (i.e., higher GEM Scale scores) is significantly associated with:

- Less self-reported partner violence
- More contraceptive use
- Higher education level.





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
