Ensuring the Sustainability of Program Impacts: Effectiveness of Title II Program Exit Strategies

The Food and Nutrition Technical Assistance III Project (FANTA) is hosting a day-long stakeholder meeting where Tufts University will present the results of a multi-year study to investigate the factors that predict program sustainability after exit. The meeting will take place November 28, from 8:30 AM - 5 PM at the Marriott Hotel Courtyard Washington Embassy Row.

The programs were assessed at the time of exit through two years after program shut down, using both qualitative methods and quantitative survey data. Four countries participated in the study: Bolivia, Honduras, India, and Kenya. Dr. Bea Rogers and Dr. Jennifer Coates will present the results of the study from each country and the conclusions and recommendations for the design of Title II development programs in the future. There will be time for questions and discussion.



Featured Information Resource: Leveraging Municipal Government Support for Agricultural Value Chains in Nicaragua

This resource, from Catholic Relief Services (CRS), outlines their 4phase strategy for creating a value-chain-friendly environment. Until recently, municipal governments in Nicaragua had not considered agricultural development to be part of their institutional mandate, making it difficult for small producers to competitively engage in agricultural value chains. CRS and its partners created the Alliance to Create Opportunities for Rural Development through Agroenterprise Relationships (ACORDAR) project in 2007. Since then, ACORDAR has helped more than 3,000 Nicaraguan farmers achieve a 98 percent increase in sales and a 117 percent increase in net income.
