ACDI/VOCA is hosting a workshop to share the TOPS I-SMART database and the results of a field test in Sierra Leone, and discuss the final steps of the program.

ACDI/VOCA was awarded a grant through the USAID TOPS (Technical and Operational Performance Support) program to develop an information management system to support project management and reporting. The ACDI/VOCA grant, from TOPS implementing organization Save the Children, funded the Information System for Management, Analysis and Reporting Timeliness (I-SMART) Project. The project has created a foundational database to be used for multi-sectoral programming including livelihood programming, health and nutrition, and some aspects of commodity management. On January 30th, we will present the I-SMART database.

## Featured Information Resource: Barrier Analysis Questionnaires

In recent years, organizations implementing FFP projects have recognized the need to develop more effective behavior change strategies. To this end, TOPS has provided training in the Designing for Behavior Change framework, which recommends the use of Barrier Analysis (BA), a survey that identifies the most significant barriers to behavior change. To implement a BA, researchers must first develop a data collection tool - the questionnaire.

TOPS created a set of [Barrier Analysis Questionnaires and Guidance](#) on how to adapt these questionnaires as references for BA implementers. The questionnaires address behaviors in the areas of maternal and child nutrition, health, water and sanitation and agriculture.
